III.b. Exam

The exam will consist of a short-answer section and a comparative essay.

For the **short-answer section**, you will need to study the following: "Facts and Study Questions" pages, character names and roles, relative dates of plays, contextual information, playhouse, rhetorical terms, and bibliographical terminology. You will also need to be able to recognize key quotations from the plays. We will keep a running list of "Terms and Concepts to Know" as the term progresses.

For the **comparative essay**, you will be responsible for reading ONE comedy, problem play, or romance that is NOT on our reading list and comparing it to at least five of the six plays that are on our reading list. You may choose from: *Two Gentlemen of Verona*, *The Comedy of Errors*, *Much Ado About Nothing*, *As You Like It*, *Twelfth Night*, *All's Well That Ends Well*, *Pericles*, or *The Tempest*.
